PASTOR MARY'S MESSAGE

Praying for a Whole New World

There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near. —Luke 21:25-28

Sometimes the world seems to be full of bad news; another shooting, another natural disaster, another war. On the Friday after Thanksgiving there was more challenging news. “The Fourth National Climate Assessment” report was released. If the report is correct, and no actions are taken, there will be substantial distress in the United States over the next 30-80 years. The scripture can feel uncomfortably real in these times.

The passage above is one of the standard readings for the first Sunday of Advent. We think of Christmas as a season filled with peace and joy. Instead, we get a dose of reality. Jesus sat with his disciples 2000 years ago and explained that at some point, or perhaps many points, there would be natural and national distress so intense that people would faint from fear. Yet, the bad news is a prelude to the good news of Christ's eventual return. This passage teaches Christians to watch for, and even expect Jesus to return when the world seems to be spiraling out of control.

However, we aren't supposed to gather on a mountain top and wait for Jesus to rescue us personally. Christians are called to be diligent workers for God in this present world. We are to work for justice, feed the hungry, give water to the thirsty, and provide shelter

to those who have nothing. We are to spread the news of Jesus far and wide, and make disciples of all nations. While we work diligently, we are also to pray diligently for God's whole new world to come on earth. Our ultimate hope is

Take heart in the midst of the challenging news of the world, Christ will come again.

not in our ability to fix all the world's problems but in the coming of the Kingdom of God on earth where there will be no suffering.

Hearing this scripture at the beginning of Advent focuses our eyes on the imperfect world as it is. It humbles us to admit that even our best efforts will not solve the world's problems permanently. It challenges us to be faithful enough to stand up in the

midst of the terrors of life and proclaim that this present darkness is not the end of the story. Finally, it pushes us to find effective ways to share the Good News of Christ, because a heart truly formed in Christian love cannot bear the thought that others might not respond in faith when the moment demands it.

We are in the season of Advent. Just like others waited two millennia ago, we find ourselves waiting for the coming of Christ. Take heart in the midst of the challenging news of the world, Christ will come again. Work diligently, pray diligently, ask God to build up the strength of your faith to face the challenges to come, and don't forget to prepare the way of the Lord for others. This, perhaps surprisingly, is what it means to prepare for Christmas.

Delivering Christmas Invitations and Cheer by the Truckload

NASHVILLE, Tennessee – What makes for the perfect Christmas gift this season? According to statistics, it's sharing experiences with family and friends. To fulfill that Christmas wish, The United Methodist Church is presenting *The True Meaning of Christmas Tour*.

Representatives will be traveling to 11 cities across the nation in a gift-wrapped truck offering family-friendly fun, while connecting visitors with a reminder of what Christmas is all about.

"Christmas is a joyful time for many, but can bring about depression, stress and loneliness for others," shares Dan Krause, chief executive of United Methodist Communications, which created the tour in partnership with local churches. "We want to help people remember that celebrating Christmas is not about to-do lists and shopping. If you're feeling stressed or alone, we want to invite you to connect with a local United Methodist church to experience fellowship and explore the true meaning of Christmas."

Pew Research found that the things people least liked about Christmas were related to commercialism and materialism. They would rather spend their time with family and friends. Eventbrite revealed that millennials place a higher value on experiences over possessions. United Methodist Communications' recent Barna Group survey, noted that people seeking a spiritual home spend the majority of their free time at restaurants and coffee houses with many engaging in volunteer activities.

Given these findings, *The True Meaning of Christmas Tour* fits the bill for what people are looking for in the weeks leading up to Christmas.

In each city, local United Methodist churches will join the truck team to host festivities that include free hot chocolate and an interactive photo booth for capturing memories. A craft station will also be on site for decorating greeting cards for those who might be in need of cheer, such as



hospital patients and nursing home residents. Attendees are also invited to share prayer requests, engage in conversations about the reason behind the season and to join local congregations for Christmas services and events.

In addition to tour stops where the truck will be on-hand, United Methodist congregations in additional locations across the U.S. will host hot cocoa fellowship events at their churches. Follow the tour online at UnwrapChristmas.org.

To reach even more people with a message of hope this Christmas, The United Methodist Church will also be running complementary national advertisements created to inspire people throughout the holiday season.

What do the Candles in Our Advent Wreath Mean?

The Advent wreath, four candles on a wreath of evergreen, is shaped in a perfect circle to symbolize the eternity of God. In some churches, four purple candles, one for each week in Advent, are used with one larger white candle in the middle as the Christ candle. Other churches prefer three purple or blue candles with one candle being rose or pink, to represent joy.

While the Advent wreath with its four candles did bring light to churches, it was not to illuminate the interior as much as to symbolize the coming of Christ. The Advent wreath began in the time of the Protestant reformer Martin Luther.



During each Sunday of the Advent season, we focus on one of the four virtues Jesus brings us: Hope, Love, Joy and Peace. Others consider the lighting of the first candle to symbolize expectation, while the second symbolizes hope, the third joy and the fourth purity. The Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day reminding Christians that Jesus is the light of the world.

The order and exact wording vary among churches, but the wreath continually reminds us of whom we are called to be as followers of Jesus.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SUPPORT

Our groups for young people are going very well, even as we contend with the challenge of lower numbers this year. Though Miriam Circle and Sisterhood are both under the auspices of UMW, I have been blessed to work with the leaders and hear the reports of young ladies energized by Christ, service and learning about the Bible. In the same manner, our young men in Joseph Fellowship and Brotherhood are plugged in and growing. Most of this flourishing is due to amazing volunteers who bring their ideas, energy and resources every month. I sometimes get questions about what young people at Baker Memorial are doing and recite our list of monthly or bi-monthly programs.

After going through the list and including Sunday school and confirmation, I try to ask for a commitment to serve. There is no ulterior motive on my part. I just know how much we are already doing on a consistent basis and how much more we would love to add to the schedule for young people. There is just no way to make these added programs viable without an influx of volunteers, so as you are evaluating your end of year commitments and making plans for 2019, think deeply about working in or leading a youth program. If you have taken a long break from service, now is the time to step up and get re-engaged. The church needs you to shine bright.

In addition to the question about youth activities, I am also asked about ways members can help out. The list is long and exhausting (not exhaustive), but the two things we need, going into the end of the year and into next year are volunteers and sponsors. In June, we had a young person who was unable to make our annual Work Trip. Their spot was paid for and as a result, a young person affiliated with this church who was not able to afford the cost, was able to go in their stead. Last month, a family called to ask if they could sponsor a young person on our upcoming Winter

Retreat and I excitedly told them yes. They promptly wrote a check and we will now be able to make the trip happen for another two youth. We often have young people who do not sign up or attend events because of the price. If you can make it easier for them by giving money to the BakerYouth program in a one-time gift or on-going basis, it will certainly lower barriers to participation.

Finally, as we close out the year, Thank You again, to all of the volunteers, parents, mentors, guardians, staff and friends who help this program make an impact in the lives of our young people. May God bless you.

Working with our young adult population has been a tremendous blessing and required quite a bit of intentional thought and planning. While we do not want to leave anyone out, events that cater to everyone tend to draw no one so, for December the young adult committee is taking a two-pronged approach.

ADULT '19 MISSION TRIP TO NEW ORLEANS






