PASTOR MARY'S MESSAGE

A Difficult Season

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven —Ecclesiastes 3:1 (NRSV)

Many people in The United Methodist Church around the world are not aware that there is a disagreement among Methodists that is so deep that it threatens to divide our “united” church. According to the book, “Unity of the Church and Human Sexuality,” which was recently published by The United Methodist Church, “Whether we want to acknowledge it or not, our church is at a fork in the road, and how we go forward or whether we go forward together as a denomination is at stake.”

It is a difficult season in the life of the church. Leaders of the Global Church are working to see how our United Methodist foundational theology of unity in the face of differences, can be lived out in the context of this particular disagreement.

The disagreement regards human sexuality; specifically whether clergy can officiate marriage of same-sex couples and whether those who are engaged in same-sex relationships can be ordained or appointed as clergy members. Underneath those challenges are additional challenges regarding Scripture interpretation, faithful living in the modern world, and United Methodist clergy and congregation commitment to follow the United Methodist Book of Discipline. Underneath those challenges is the bedrock challenge to our understanding that we can be united in Christ even while having differing understanding on some theological points.

Sadly, even though all United Methodists agree that the two greatest commandments are to love God completely, and love our neighbors as we love ourselves, the conversations and behaviors around these challenges have become quite heated and unloving at times. At the 2016 General Conference, which is the global meeting of United Methodist leaders



that takes place every four years, a request was made to stop discussion before permanent damage was done without adequate reflection. A decision was then made to convene a group of 32 individuals with different opinions, gifts, and skills to prayerfully discern how God would have us proceed. This 32 member, "Commission on a Way Forward" has been tasked to bring a proposal to a special session of the General Conference in February 2019. In other words, we will need to wait for at least a year before we see the proposal to be considered. After the General Conference votes in February 2019, each annual conference will vote in the annual conference meetings throughout 2019. A decision will not be clear until at least 2020.



While this seems slow in our world of rapid decision making, the foundational theology of unity in the midst of diverse opinions is a worthy topic and there are many things we can be doing as we wait.

- Most importantly we can pray, not for our favorite answer to be chosen, but rather that the Spirit of God will guide the Commission members to a faithful proposal. Perhaps to something we have not even considered. We can also pray for God to prepare those who will vote at the 2019 Special Session of General Conference to receive the report with open hearts and minds.
- We can also focus our attention on what Christ has called us to do, which is to grow in our own discipleship, and help others become Disciples of Christ. We should not turn our local church focus away from our greatest responsibility in this difficult season.
- Finally, we can choose to trust the process and the people who are carrying the responsibility of discernment. The people involved in the commission are deeply faithful people who love Christ and the Church. They have substantial diversity of opinion reflected in their membership and do not need to be second guessed during their difficult process.

When the time is right, we will understand the options before us as a congregation and the steps that need to be taken.

There is no need to worry or become anxious. When the time is right, we will understand the options before us as a congregation and the steps that need to be taken.

The Commission On A Way Forward has recently released a short progress report. It is very high level, but also very readable. I encourage you to read it at, <http://www.umc.org/news-and-media/commission-on-a-way-forward-issues-status-report>. I also have several copies of the book "Unity of the Church and Human Sexuality." If you would like to take a look at one, please let me know. Finally, let us remember that while we feel assured in our own thinking, the person next to us in the pew may have a different opinion. In this difficult season, we need to work very hard to speak carefully, and listen deeply to our brothers and sisters in Christ so that we do not fail to live the two greatest commandments to the best of our ability.

Youth Ministry

WE BELONG TO EACH OTHER

I typically write to youth and parents, but this month I want to address this article to parents of teens at Baker Memorial. If you have attended long at all, you know how diligent we are about creating opportunities for young people to support one another, learn from each other and grow in their faith. These opportunities include one-time events, and monthly or bi-monthly programs. When looking at all of this activity I'm sure it can seem daunting or over the top, but let me encourage you to overcome any hesitation and lead your teen to engage. Let me elaborate.

As you probably know, a few weeks ago, a young man attempted suicide at Geneva High School. The next day, a threat was phoned in that there would be a shooting. When you add these tragic circumstances to the trauma Saint Charles East attendees experienced this year, it becomes clear how much young people need healthy environments to build up one another free from judgment and scorn.

Following the incident at Geneva High, a friend and myself got together and he asked the question, "How are we preparing young people to help their friends with these kinds of challenges?" It really caused me to think, because the Bible tells us to carry each other's burdens to reflect the love of Christ. While we work to make sure young people are connected with the Baker Memorial community and are growing in their faith, we also diligently work as a youth ministry to equip young people to help others. It is part and parcel of what we do.

A few weeks prior to these shocking events in Geneva, a young man named Logic performed a song named, "1-800-273-8255". It details the story of his own struggle with suicide. The name of the song is the number to the suicide hotline and Logic tells his story through the lyrics of feeling like there is no hope. After his song and



performance, calls to the suicide hotline went up 30 percent. That number is heartening because youth are finding hope, but it is troubling because, how many more young people in our world are facing a sense of fear, isolation and hopelessness? They are in our homes, on our streets, and if one of us hurt, we all feel the pain.

We belong to one another. If one of us is struggling, we want to express the love of Christ to them. As we become whole, our mission is to train leaders among us to recover their friends and acquaintances. We all have a part in this, young people and adults. One way you, as an adult can make a difference, is by reaching out to a young person this month. Greet them in Baker Hall or drop by the youth center, downstairs. Let them know they are not alone and you are in their corner fighting for them to flourish.

Pray for us, as well.

GETTING INVOLVED

Last month was pretty packed with events and good times. We opened a new book (*A Guide to Prayer for All Who Seek God*) beginning study on scriptures and reflections, we also hosted the Neighborhood Block Party and a really cool Murder Mystery Dinner. This month, we intend to put a little sweat equity into a home for Habitat for Humanity on October 14th. We will continue meeting every other week on Wednesday night and we're adding a new event—an after hours mixer—because meeting young adults where they are is essential to the mission of Christ.

These are great successes to celebrate because over the past few weeks, many challenges facing our world have come into stark focus. From hurricanes and earthquakes, to hunger and racism we are bombarded by issues that demand our attention. Young adults want to help, too. The conversations I've been involved in bear this out. So, where to begin?

The best starting point is where Jesus began his ministry and where he returned repeatedly—prayer, meditation and solitude. Christ launched his ministry with a prayer to the Father. As he was baptized and as he performed the first miracle, he called out to God. When people pressed him and his disciples wavered, he went aside and prayed in the garden, on the mountain or in a quiet place. This is the best example we can follow. Before diving into any kind of advocacy, humanitarian or activist work we should find a place to pray. We should seek to hear what he said during his earthly ministry and what he is telling the church today. As we pray, we can see clearly and know the best direction to go with our labors.

The next step and a great resource is the United Methodist Church website. On there, we can learn about people with shoes on the ground in Houston, Florida, Puerto Rico and the Caribbean Islands devastated by wind and water. You can learn about one of the best ways to stretch your donations. You can discover stories of hope that can guide your own efforts and the efforts of those with whom you are in contact, either here, near or far away in storm damaged communities.

Additionally, the United Methodist Church website has

Often, these arguments simply serve to retrench ideas and biases that we've built up over time. These habits often push us further apart, contradicting Jesus' prayer that we be One as he and the Father are One. 

We are blessed to have a full staff on board at our Church. It is a wonderful staff that is doing God's work, providing the guidance and support to carry out the programs and mission of our Church. The cost for the full staff was included in the budget as was the increase in the giving to cover those additional costs.

In review of our financial situation at mid-year, our giving is falling short of the budgeted goal. YTD our operating fund balances continue to decline as our disbursements exceed the unrestricted giving amounts.

Annual budgets are due October 2nd. We are asking each group to prayerful review their own budgets for 2017 just as we will be looking for each member to review their pledges during the upcoming stewardship drive as we strive for a balanced budget in 2017.






